Conference report



The 10th Informed Cities Forum (ICF) took place from 23-25 November 2022 in Grenoble, the 2022 European Green Capital, with over 50 participants attending from all over Europe. Researchers, local government representatives, entrepreneurs, mobility experts and civic technology enthusiasts got together for three days to discuss urban mobility, cross-sectoral links and private and public involvement in building better and stronger mobility relationships. After the last two years where impacted by the pandemic, the anniversary edition of the ICF went back to its original interactive and innovative format: an in-person event that puts aside PowerPoint presentations and places engaging discussions, round table acitivites, games, and study tours in the centre of the programme.

Moreover, the City of Grenoble organised several site visits to show the ICF participants the latest mobility measures implemented in the city, a best-case study tour on SUMP implementation and transit-oriented approaches.

The venues

The City of Grenoble offered two unique venues for the indoor sessions. On the first and third days they took place in the City Hall, one of Grenoble's most symbolic buildings. It was given in 2003 the "Patrimoine du XXe siècle" (20th Century Heritage) by the French state for its remarkable contemporary architecture. On the second day, the ICF moved to Le Totem, a co-working space supported by the national government to foster and promote innovative start-ups in the French city.

Day 1 Opening

The mayor of the European Green Capital opened the 10th Informed Cities Forum in Grenoble's City Hall, and a brief panel discussion preceded the first site visits. Site visits

Grenoble developed the area around the train station following a transport-oriented perspective which prioritised public transport and active mobility. Once dominated by private cars and traffic jumps, the space accommodates now new tram lines, segregated bus lanes, Grenoble's most extensive bike-sharing station and plenty of room for pedestrians and cyclists. The Mvélo+ hub, located in the square, offers 9000+ bicycles and repair and maintenance services to its users.



Day 2

The Mobility Treasure Hunt

Mobility Treasure Hunt and SUMPPLUS workshops

Grenoble's public transport
network was used at its full potential by the participants of the ICF during
the Mobility Treasure Hunt. Grouped in teams,
they had to follow the enigmatic instructions on a map
to discover the final secret code that would make them the winners.

Following the instructions correctly, they could not only enjoy the services of the bus and tram networks but also have a glimpse of Grenoble's car-sharing system, appreciate one of its several pedestrian areas and count the cycling trips that happen in the city every day.



PLAN, TALK, ENGAGE



Three sessions focused on the SUMP-PLUS project and how to address the gaps when considering the successful implementation of Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans. The participants were guided on the development of Transition Pathways to achieve long-term city visions (PLAN), short-term Implementation Strategies to enable the effective delivery of measures (TALK), and necessary governance reforms (ENGAGE).
